Shannon Speed is a tribal citizen of the Chickasaw Nation of Oklahoma. She is Director of the American Indian Studies Center (AISC) and Professor of Gender Studies and Anthropology at UCLA. Dr. Speed has worked for the last two decades in Mexico and in the United States on issues of indigenous autonomy, sovereignty, gender, neoliberalism, violence, migration, social justice, and activist research. She has published more than forty journal articles and book chapters in English and Spanish, and has published six books and edited volumes, including her the awardwinning, Incarcerated Stories: Indigenous Women Migrants and Violence in the Settler Capitalist State (University of North Carolina Press Critical Indigeneities Series 2020) and the co-edited volume with Dr. Lynn Stephen, Heightened States of *Injustice: Activist Research on Indigenous Women and Violence* (University of Arizona Press 2021). She received the Chickasaw Dynamic Woman of the Year award from the Chickasaw Nation in 2014 and the Lifetime Achievement Award from the State Bar of Texas Indian Law Section in 2016. In 2021 she received the President's Award from the American Anthropological Association (AAA) in recognition of her collaborative research with Indigenous women. Dr. Speed recently served as the President of the Native American and Indigenous Studies Association (NAISA 2018-2021).
